A management representative regularly visits the college, after the publication of Semester results, to analyze the results that promotes the concentration of the staff. The management is towards the positive development of the college. The members visit the campus whenever there is need.

The management conducts regular meetings with the Principal/ IQAC Coordinator and Office Superintendent. The activities of the college are communicated to the management by them. In case of expenses, consent is received from the management and the activities are carried out flawlessly. In case of grievances, proper solutions are received.

There are two teacher-representatives in the management body, apart from the Principal. They too take part in the management meetings. The minutes are maintained by the Educational society.

The customized Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) is under process in which any data related to any student will be available. The system was designed by the college web development team.

<b>CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS</b>
<b>1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation</b>
<b>1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well-planned curriculum delivery and documentation.</b>
<p>At the end of every semester department meetings are held to allot the subject to staff members and to fix the timetable for the forthcoming semester. The timetable with six day orders is submitted to the Principal by the respective Heads at the end of every semester itself for the perfect start of classes from the first day itself. Minutes of the meetings are also maintained in the departments. Timetable committee consists of six teaching staff and one non-teaching staff is there to fix the hours for common subjects like Part I, Part II and Non-Major electives.</p> <p>Calendar committee consists of five staff members and one non-teaching staff is there to prepare handbooks with rules, regulations, staff details, scholarship details and working days with day orders. During vacation the college hand book is prepared by the members of Calendar committee and is distributed to both staff and students at the beginning of every semester. Classes are held according to the day order and time table.</p> <p>Bridge Course is conducted for the first year students at the beginning of every year, to prepare students to meet the college environment and requirements. In the academic year 2018-19, first two days were allotted for the Bridge Course. Behavioral practice in co- education institution, semester pattern, Choice Based Credit System, extra/ co-curricular activities, scholarship details, foundation of basic communication, important topics and basic concepts of the respective programmes were covered.</p> <p>As per the affiliating university three internal tests are mandatory every semester with the interval of 30 days each. (90 working days per semester). So, for the purpose of systematic teaching / a proper work plan is prepared by every department and the work is done as per the plan. The details are</p>

documented. Marks with attendance are entered to the university portal within the stipulated time. For periodic assessment, students are trained to answer university questions in class tests.

Necessary text and reference books are available in the central library and some in department library for smooth handling of classes. For some subjects simplified notes are prepared by staff and distributed to the students.

Even though Chalk and Talk is a regular curriculum delivery method adopted, there is a gradual shift to the new modes of teaching. Use of LCD projectors, online materials, seminars and presentation by students are also adopted for effective teaching. In all final year classes LCD projectors are available.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the Institution? [Can be substantiated with a model feedback form.]				
Feedback obtained through well structured questionnaire is analyzed by using SPSS package. The following are the outcome of the feedback.				
<b>Student's Feedback Positive commands:</b> From the students feedback analysis, they felt that the Teachers-Students cordiality and the activities of youth welfare, NSS, NCC, YRC are excellent. Other activities such as improving communication skills, placement opportunities, sports, competition encouragement, and office services are good.				
<b>Student's Feedback - To be improved - Arts:</b> According to simple percentage tool analysis, the opinion of arts students towards canteen, toilet and drinking water facilities scored very low percentage value of 42.3%, 31.7% and 31.4% respectively.				
<b>Student's Feedback - To be improved Science:</b> According to simple percentage tool analysis, the opinion of science students towards canteen, toilets and drinking water facilities scored a very poor percentage of 30.79%, 19.20% and 32.6% respectively.				
<b>Teacher's Feedback Positive commands:</b> From the teacher's feedback analysis, they felt that the Administration – Teacher cordiality, working environment are excellent.				
<b>Teacher's Feedback -To be improved:</b> According to Kolmogorov-Smirnov Z test, the opinion of teachers towards separate space in college canteen for teachers, waste management practices and toilet facilities scored very low percentage of 2.69%, 2.697% and 2,712 respectively at 95% level of confidence.				
<b>Parent's Feedback Positive commands:</b> From the parent's feedback, they felt that the fees structure,				

admission procedure, scholarship are excellent.

**Parent's Feedback To be improved:** According to one sample T test, the opinion of parents towards, transport facility to the college and facilities provided by the college shows very low value of 3.91% and 3.96% respectively at 95% level of confidence.

**Alumni's Feedback Positive commands:** From the Alumni feedback they felt that the Infrastructure and the Lab Facilities are Excellent and the courses offered are very good.

**Alumni's Feedback - To be improved:** The opinion about the faculty, office staff and overall rating of the college scored very low percentage of 34.84%, 16.78% and 9.59% respectively.

**Initiative taken by the management based on the feedback from various stakeholders:**

**2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details.**

So far, all the teachers monitored their respective learners. They supported them by identifying the slow/ average and advanced learners. The advanced learners were motivated to participate inter collegiate competition and to present research papers in seminars and workshops. The average students were motivated to be better performers. The main focus of teachers was the slow learners. The reason for their lacking was analyzed and solved by the teachers. Presently, the same is done by the same teachers, but with a mild difference. The same is done systematically with a name Mentor-Mentee system, Student Improvement Scheme (SIS). Accordingly, each Mentor (Full time teacher) is assigned a maximum of 30 learners. The mentors fill up the biographic details of each learner in the presence of his parents/ guardians. The photographs are attached to the SIS booklet. The attendance/progress of the Mentees are entered and signed by the Mentors/ Heads/ IQAC- Co-ordinator, Principal and counter signed by parents at the publication of every semester results. The Mentors are responsible for the academic and non-academic performances of their Mentees. Proper guidance/ suggestions necessary to the advancement of a Mentee is rendered. The Mentors are mentoring their Mentees both formally and personally.

### **2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level**

As an affiliated college there is a limited scope for making reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). The college adheres to the guidelines laid down by the university with reference to the evaluation reforms and makes all possible efforts to ensure the effective implementation. The attendance and internal assessment of every student is displayed on the notice board in the departments so that evaluation process is implemented on time and no delay in internal assessment records happens. Internal Assessment is conducted thrice per semester. Assignments and seminars are assigned. Group discussions are encouraged. For every paper, 25% marks are assigned for internal assessments. Of the 25%, 20% marks are given for written tests and 5% is given for Assignments. Of the three internals, two best scores are considered. The average of two best scores is added to the Assignment score. Thus the internal mark is calculated out of 25%. In case of absence for 2 internals, the concerned teacher used to conduct special tests so far. Presently, there is no provision for special tests. Hence, average for available marks is calculated and added to the Assignment score for 25%. The record of class attendance is meticulously maintained by the college office and displayed every month and thus transparency is maintained. Class tests are another mechanism whereby students' progress is evaluated and communicated. The stakeholders are informed about the internal assessment. This regular assessment helps the students to know their strength, to think independently and to gain confidence. It also makes them aware of their weakness and make them plan accordingly. This adherence does not permit any reform in CIE.

### **2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters**

Academic calendar was prepared by the Calendar Committee consisting of 4 teaching staff assisted by a typist and junior assistant before the commencement of the academic year and it is adhered strictly, throughout the academic year. Very rarely there may be a change, due to collector's order or natural calamities. Commencements of internal tests are notified in academic calendar. But semester examination dates are announced only by the affiliating university.

<p>The institution provides adequate facility of physical infrastructure for conduct of Academic, Sports and other Cocurricular activities. There is a systematic procedure for the purchase as well as maintenance of infrastructural facilities including all sorts of equipments. First the proposal is submitted and then it's evaluation is done by the college office. It must get the approval by the principal and then quotations are invited. After the approval of the management the required item is purchased and entered in the stock register. At the end of every</p>									

academic year stock verification is done by the staff members assigned by the principal. HODs of the concerned departments and Lab incharges look after the maintenance of their respective lab equipments and other facilities. Stock register and maintenance account is maintained by lab technicians and supervised by HODs of the concerned departments. The nonteaching staff are also trained in maintenance of lab materials and equipments. Librarian and supporting staff in the central library regularly monitor the condition of the library stock, maintain rare books, collection, issue and maintenance of the books. Library cards are issued to the students. Department library in some departments is maintained by the supporting staff of the concerned departments. Librarian is responsible to collect the required list of books based on updated syllabus from the concerned department HODs at the beginning of every academic year. The finalized list of required books is duly approved and signed by the Principal and librarian monitors all the purchase. To ensure return of books, 'no dues' from the library is mandatory for students before appearing their exam. The proper account of visitors (students and staff) on daily basis is maintained. The Library rules for the students are available in a Student Hand Book (2018 2019, Pages 5759). The Physical Education, Health Education and Sports department and Director of Physical Education is very active and encourages students to participate in various sports activities, along with training and coordinating various sports in the college. Outdoor game facilities for Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Cricket, Tennis, KhoKho, Hand Ball, Hockey and indoor facilities for Basket Ball, Batminton and Table Tennis board are available for students. Multipurpose Indoor stadium is available. Sixteen station gymnasium is available for students to maintain physical fitness. Department of youth welfare encourages students in cultural activities. The equipments/instruments available are Parrai, thavil, Kumbam, Kavadi, Salangai, Kiluku, Murasu, Singi, Kolattam sticks, Drum, Western Costumes, Folk dance, Mime Costumes, Oyil Clothes, Audio system and two ladders that are used by students with special interest. The equipments like air conditioners, UPS, generators, water motors, pumps, water purifiers and water coolers are also taken care of either by AMC or time to time inspection. Day to day maintenance is ensured by the supporting staff. Fire extinguishers, CCTV cameras, LCD projectors have been installed at identified locations. The college website is maintained regularly by Ethoughtz, Chennai. Adequate Inhouse staff is employed to meticulously maintain hygiene and cleanliness of the campus so as to provide a congenial learning environment.

## **Student Improvement Scheme**

### **Objectives:**

To establish individual attention of students

To provide support to excel in both academic and non-academic activities of the students

To show the academic record of the students to their parents

### **Context:**

Faculty-Student mentorship involves tutoring, role modelling, career guidance and in PG & research departments research skill development activities

### **The Practice:**

Students Guidance & counseling committee consisting of four staff members and faculty in charge system for a class exists in the college already to provide personal and academic assistance to the students. To do individual attention to the students, the college has adopted the new process "Student Improvement Record", to monitoring and mentoring the student's activity. The scheme aims at addressing conflicts in attitudes, habits and knowledge of the students towards learning practices.

Each faculty will be the mentor of a group of 20 to 25 students. Students will have mentors from the parent department and for some students mentors are from language and allied department faculties. The faculties will continue to be mentors for the same group of students till their graduation. For the benefits of the students the mentor will perform the following functions.

- \*Continuously monitor, counsel, guide and motivate the students in all academic matters

- \* Maintain personal details of the students

- \* Maintain student's academic performance semester wise

- \*Conduct parents meet at least once per semester to show the academic records of their wards

- \* Contact parents if any academic irregularities and other negative behavioral changes

- \*Advise the students in matters of their career

- \*Guide the students in taking up extra and co-curricular activities

To be nutshell, mentors take total care of their mentees, academically, personal behavior and enhance the quality of learners to better person. Mentors takes care of the students relating to his/her housing, studying, and behaviors and boosts his moral whenever required for the betterment.

### **Constraints:**

Face-to-face meetings with parents, Maintenance of paper record instead of e-record since most of the parents are uneducated and most of the students are first generation learners.

**Evidence of Success:**

Improvements in academic performance, attendance, positive social and emotional behavior

**Problems encountered:**

Most of the parents are daily wages employees; there is a problem in conducting parents meet at a particular day and time. This sometimes disturbs regular classes of a faculty and their lunch time.

All Faculty members are acting as a mentor for a particular set of students for their personal interest, but the counseling methods may vary.

**Resources required:**

Some trained counselors.

**Silambam and Self-Defense for Social Security**

The NSS units of our college organize a traditional Tamil practice Silambam and self-defense training classes for the students including the girls. This training is of dual purpose:

- a. Self-protection for students
- b. Conserving our traditional art.

**Objectives:**

Self-defense helps to prepare the students to face threatening situations and also helps to develop increased mental and physical health. Women, usually referred to as the weaker sex, are easier targets. The cases of gender violence are on rise, out of which many go unreported, self-defense for women has become a necessity. By learning the basics of self-defense, one prepares oneself for threatening and unexpected circumstances.

**Context:**

A counselor is necessary to ensure the importance of self-defense. There is a curriculum for martial arts. In order to become a teacher of that art, the person must be well versed in the art. Each student is gifted with different mental, physical and emotional resources.

**Practice : Coaching**

Regular practice is executed for both boys and girls for two hours and on two days per week.

**Evidence of success:**

Students complete in the state level/ All India level competitions.

**Problems encountered:**

Dr. Illakkuvan, Assistant Professor of Tamil takes care of the coaching for boys. To train girls there is a lack of a coach.

**Resources required:**

A well trained instructor for self-defense is necessary. Financial support is needed for the instructor who gives training for the students. The instructor must understand and embrace the fact that if he allows creativity, the student will surpass the master.

The equipment available for cultural practice are *Parai, Thavil, Kumbam, Kavadi, Salangai, Kilukku, Murasu, Singi, Kolattam Sticks Drum*, Western costumes, Folk costumes, Mime costumes, *Oyil* cloths, Orchestra system and ladders.

The cultural team has its own contribution to the development of the society. They often give guest programmes to the public, especially in awareness programs.

We are very proud to record that six of our alumni belongs to cultural team has created YouTube videos in the name of "Dream Creation". Currently they have uploaded 32 videos of their own performance during college days and after. At present they have 1213 subscribers and 46,637 views.
